Per contract, GCBH requires all Network Providers to provide services in a culturally competent manner at all times. GCBH Network Providers will maintain clinical record content for services provided using MHBG funding. GCBH will conduct audits per contract requirements for Network Providers. By contract, GCBH Network Providers agree to cooperate with GCBH in the evaluation of the contractor's performance and to make available all information required by any such evaluation process.

Begin writing here : GCBH BH-ASO employs several Children's Mental Health Specialists, who provides technical assistance, consultation and care coordination for children with SED and/or who may have multiple needs. GCBH also offers in two of its counties a First Episode Psychosis (FEP) Program, which services Transition Age Youth between the ages of 15-25 experiencing an early onset of psychosis. The focus of these pilot programs is to build capacity for the assessment, case management and treatment of these youth experiencing FEP. GCBH has also developed the Youth Navigator Program in all nine of its counties. GCBH has also develop Youth Mobile Teams in Benton, Franklin, Walla Walla/Columbia, Kittitas, Asotin/Garfield, and Yakima Counties.

The BHAB meets quarterly or as needed and is given information regarding the Executive Committee and Sub-Committee Meetings. The BHAB reviews policies, procedures, and plans (including the MHBG and SUPTRS plans) and makes recommendations to the Executive Committee as needed.
